Introducing your audience to the issue of modern slavery

This may be the first time that your audience is hearing about the issue of modern slavery, so using this shocking statistic can be a highly effective conversation opener.

Why not use this resource to engage your audience and then as a jumpoff to explore the issues further, with support from the resources in this pack.

Breaking down the definition

These graphics go into more detail, including the legal definitions, and so are aimed at audiences who may already have a higher awareness level or who have already seen the introductory graphics in another context. They also explain more about forms of trafficking that are less common in the UK but are a significant problem globally, including domestic servitude and forced marriage.



Infographics

This set of graphics contains more visual elements and thought-provoking facts and comparisons to get your audience and stakeholders talking and thinking about the issue of modern slavery. They also raise awareness of the extent to which trafficking and modern slavery affects not just foreigners but also British nationals (especially children and teenagers).

> The first graphic makes clear that human trafficking is not just about the sex trade; it is very much about exploitation in the supply chains of large, reputable companies.

Additional Infographics

These infographics expose the hidden realities of modern slavery, showing how exploitation affects both foreign nationals and British citizens, including children and teenagers. They highlight that trafficking extends beyond the sex trade, infiltrating supply chains of major companies. The Exploitation Spectrum showcases the range of labor abuses from unsafe working conditions to forced labor. By raising awareness, these graphics aim to spark conversations and encourage action to combat exploitation and uphold human rights globally.

Modern Slavery is a global issue and requires a global response, particularly for businesses operating in challenging and changing contexts.

This year we will explore the need for international collaboration to develop robust responses, including geographyspecific legislation to address the risks of exploitation in global business operations and supply chains.

The next two slides explain more about some of the challenges faced by businesses around the world and the current and emerging legislation that aims to protect businesses and individuals from the effects of labour exploitation.

By recognising the risks from these challenging contexts and ensuring compliance with legislation is a high-priority within their operations, businesses can begin to work towards exploitation-free supply chains.

29.3 MILLION PEOPLE IN MODERN SLAVERY IN ASIA AND THE PACIFIC.

What is a challenging context?

According to the **Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights** (OHCHR), there are three types of challenging context where heightened due diligence may be required to ensure RBC (Risk-Based Capital).

Conflict, political instability, or systemic violation of human rights

- 'Conventional' armed conflict
- Military occupation
- Mass atrocities
- Violence by non-state actors, e.g. terrorist groups
- Severe human rights violations during peacetimes
- Systemic human rights violations by state actors

National law aligns with recognised human rights standards, but protection in practice is limited

- Weak law enforcement
- Weak governance and rule of law
- Corruption
- Widespread poverty
- Limited government resources
- Poor infrastructure
- Systemic human rights violations by state actors

National law is inconsistent with human rights standards

- Employment law obligates discrimination against certain groups
- Freedom of association suppressed in law
- Little protection from forced labour or child labour in law

Spot the signs of modern slavery

The poster on this page goes into detail about some of the common signs of modern slavery, focusing on the indicators of forced labour in particular. These signs are the kind of thing that could be seen from a distance, without needing to know about a worker's individual circumstances, pay or living conditions.

Gap Analysis



Site Assessments


